Message from Sister Donna...our Provincial Superior



Since our last *Franciscan Review*, a couple of our Sisters and our Chaplain have entered eternal life. We have a couple more people to intercede for us.

Sr. Mary Louise died on July 4. Sister taught many years in grade and high school and worked with training our postulants and novices. In her later years she worked at St.

Gerard's Community of Care and did a lot with the legislature to help the elderly. We will miss her!

Fr. Brooks died September 19 in Essentia Hospital in Fargo. He was hoping to live longer, but when he was told that he would have to be on oxygen the rest of his life, he chose to go on palliative care. It was interesting: Monsignor Donahue was there, as well as Sr. Sara Marie and myself, when the doctor was talking with Fr. Brooks. Msgr. Donahue asked Fr. Brooks, "Would you like to go to confession?" Fr. Brooks said, "Yes."

Immediately, the doctor said "everybody out!" After his confession was finished, Monsignor called Sr. Sara and me back into the room. Monsignor then anointed him and gave him the apostolic blessing. Msgr. then put a first-

class relic of St. Faustina between his and Fr. Brooks's hand. We then prayed the rosary and the Divine Mercy Chaplet.

Shortly after Monsignor said to Fr. Brooks "St. Joseph is here waiting for you; you are welcome to go whenever you want." Very shortly afterward, his breathing got very shallow. Monsignor again gave him the apostolic blessing and within seconds Fr. Brooks took his last breath. All I could think of was "WOW, what a way to leave this life!"

Death can be a very difficult time, but it can also be a beautiful experience! The Lord provides many beautiful experiences but we need to take the time and pay attention to our surroundings. We also need to take the time and ask the Lord for help when we are in need of it. It is also good to give praise and thanks during the day. It is amazing when we take the time during the day to stop and look at our surroundings and the people God has put in our lives.

We also have difficult times but some of these difficult times can also help us to grow and many times enable us to help others. Thank you Lord for Your many graces and blessings each day.

Sister Rebecca Metzger, OSF

Oct. 4, 1944-Jan. 17, 2023



Baptised Gail Marie, Sr. Rebecca grew up on a farm near Wales, ND. The oldest of seven children, she had a lifelong love of people and pets. Her family was very dear to her, and even when battling cancer, she enjoyed an occasional trip to the Fargo area to take part in family gatherings and visit her mother.

Sr. Rebecca served at St. Anne's Guest Home in Grand Forks from the 1960s until her death from cancer, except for a five year period she spent administering the hospital in Cando.

Over her years, first as activity director and later as administrator, she put her gifts to use, utilizing her degree in occupational therapy as well as her knack for problem solving, decorating, and working with people.

In the late 1970s, when the building was no longer usable due to fire safety concerns, Sr. Rebecca worked tirelessly with community members to add on to the new site and set up HUD housing.

She is dearly missed by her family and Sisters.

Sister Mary Louise Jundt, OSF

May 17, 1931-Jul. 4, 2023

Sr. Mary Louise (Rosie) grew up near Fulda, ND. She met Sisters from our community during vacation schools and would become a candidate during her time at St. Francis Academy.

Sister Mary Louise was a professed Sister for nearly 73 years. She taught at Catholic schools in Rugby, Lidgerwood, and Hankinson. In 1970 she was elected Provincial Superior and held the position for 18 years, attending important meetings around the world and sharing her wisdom and experience during difficult years.

In this role, she served in a leadership capacity on boards of our various healthcare institutes. Sr. Mary Louise was very dedicated to the prolife movement. She also helped start a day retreat program. She was always gracious and receptive to all who came to her.

From 2000 on, she served at St. Gerard's; in 2006 she became the Assistant Administrator there, a job that grew into development and human resources. She worked with the North Dakota Long Term Care Association and legislators at the State Capitol.

Eucharistic Miracles Associated with the Franciscan Order

As you probably know, we are in the midst of a Eucharistic Revival (called by the U.S. Bishops). At this time, since more attention has been given to Eucharistic miracles, especially those documented by Blessed Carlo Acutis, we wanted to share with you some Eucharistic miracles with ties to the Franciscan Order.

St. Francis and the Lamb (retold by St. Bonaventure)
One time some people brought as a gift to St. Francis a sheep, and he accepted it with gratitude, because he loved the innocence and the simplicity that the sheep demonstrated by nature. The man of God admonished the little lamb to praise God and to absolutely not bother the brothers. The sheep, for his part, sensed the piety of this man of God, and he put these teachings into practice with great care...During the celebration of the Mass, at the moment of elevation, he would bow down, knees bent, as if it were that this devout little animal wished to reproach men of little faith for their irreverence and encourage devout men for their reverence towards the Blessed Sacrament.

St. Clare's Victory, 1240

Saint Clare lived with her Sisters at St. Damiano, near Assisi. While she was very sick, Arab troops were nearby, threatening to invade. She prayed for protection and brought out the Blessed Sacrament, trusting in Our Lord. At this, the soldiers fled.

St. Anthony and the Mule

St. Anthony was a famous preacher, but a certain man had a problem believing the truths of the Faith taught by this amazing saint. In his incredulity, he wagered to Anthony, promising to believe and adhere to the Church's teaching if his mule showed him! The pretext was that the poor animal would be deprived of food for three days. Then, the animal would be brought to the piazza, where St. Anthony would also be, carrying the Blessed Sacrament. Hay would be put in front of him. All this transpired as determined, but the famished mule took no interest in fodder. Instead, he bent his knees (as well as any donkey can) before the Blessed Sacrament.

Lanciano, Italy

This event took place probably in the early to mid 700s. A monk was celebrating Mass and having doubts about Christ's true presence under the Eucharistic species. At Mass, during the words of Consecration, the bread and wine visibly turned into flesh and blood, respectively. Scientific study showed that the flesh is cardiac tissue, and the blood is Type AB. A fascinating detail is that this blood type matches findings from the Shroud of Turin as well as the Sudarium of Oviedo. This Eucharistic miracle is preserved in the Church of St. Francis in Lanciano.

Agivnon, France, 1433

This event is, in a way, reminiscent of the Exodus story. A group of Franciscans called the Gray Penitents had, at that time, the practice of perpetual Eucharistic adoration in their church. Days of rain caused severe flooding that November, and four of the Franciscans decided they had better go to the church to take care of the Blessed Sacrament. Amazingly, when they arrived, the flood waters were parted, to the right and to the left of altar, so there was an area of dry space straight from the door to where Jesus was exposed. After getting other members of the order to witness the miracle, they took the Blessed Sacrament to dry land.

O sublime humility! O humble sublimity! The Lord of the universe, God and Son of God, so humbles Himself that for our salvation He hides Himself under an ordinary piece of bread! Brothers, look at the humility of God and pour out your hearts before Him! ~ St. Francis

Eucharistic Revival Reflections

Our own time is not unlike the Middle Ages, the time of St. Francis. Our world mirrors, in many ways the same discontent, wars, violence, poverty, abuse, greed and the need for power.

St. Francis found the churches neglected and many needing repair. Among both laity and clergy there was need of restoration of

a wounded people who were broken and in need of healing, forgiveness, mercy and love. Many had fallen away from the faith in the God who created them to know Him, love Him and to serve Him in this world and throughout eternity.

Our world today does mirror that of the Middle Ages. Our churches are half-empty. Many do not feel they need to attend church, as God can be found anywhere. We continue to be a broken people, wounded and searching for something better. Wars and violence have taken over many on the global scene as well as here in the western world. We have questioned our existence and have tried to erase our history so we can believe the lies we are being fed by Satan.

St. Francis found the solution when he answered God's call to go and "rebuild [His] church": The holy Eucharist! Every fiber of the heart of St. Francis was aglow with love for the Sacrament of the Body of Christ. With exceedingly great admiration, he marveled at the loving condescension and the condescending love of our Lord. He considered it an unpardonable negligence not to attend Mass every day whenever possible. (St. Francis and the Eucharist by Albert J. Nimeth)

This past year, we hosted both the men's and women's Ecclesia Domestica retreats, which gave attendees the opportunity to begin the restoration of their marriage and family, and thus the whole Church.

St. John Paul II often shared in his talks and writings that "as the family goes, so goes the nation and so goes the whole world in which we live." We recognize that both marriage and family are in crisis due to the breakdown of our society. People feel it is their right to live however they decide and that life must be defined in such a way that it coincides with "ME" and not an "outdated ideology of faith beliefs." Once again our Holy Father, St. John Paul II, stated: "It is Jesus that you seek when you dream of happiness; He is waiting for you when nothing else you find satisfies you; He is the beauty to which you are so attracted; it is He who provoked you with that thirst for a fullness that will not let you settle for compromise; it is He who urges you to shed the masks of a false life; it is He who reads in your heart your most genuine choices, the choices that others try to stifle.



It is Jesus who stirs in you the desire to do something great with your lives, the

will to follow an ideal, the refusal to allow yourselves to be ground down by mediocrity, the courage to commit yourselves humbly and patiently to improving yourselves and society, making the world more human and more fraternal."

We recognize that the battle for holiness is answering Gods call, reclaiming our identity as the beloved children of our Father and surrendering our plans for Gods plan. We know that each one of us should be treated as an object of love, not as an object to be used. We are a wounded and broken people. God's mercy, love and forgiveness are key to our growth in .holiness. The solution to restoring the family and the Church is the Holy Eucharist.

Both the men's and women's Ecclesia Domestica retreats are a call to holiness. They are part of a Marian movement that shows us that Mary's faith and relationship to her Son is the model for the Church to follow. In Mary's *fiat*, we hear our *Amen* made possible in the Eucharist.


